Grantee Highlights No Limits Warming Shelter

At the GHCF August board meeting, Roscoe Brittan, No Limits Program Manager, gave a presentation about their new Warming Station. In 2020, the GHCF gave a grant to help fund the Warming Station which is an extension of the No Limits Warming Center. The Warming Station is a mobile unit which can go anywhere the most vulnerable population of the community are located and help meet their needs. The ultimate goal is to get a homeless individual permanently housed.

The Walter Harper Project Earlier this year, GHCF donated \$2,500 to help fund a life-size bronze statue of Walter Harper, the first person to summit Denali. The statue was unveiled in July, in front of the Doyon building near the William R. Wood footbridge. It is entitled "A Hand Up" because Harper's incredible feat gave a hand up to other mountaineers who followed. The sculptor, Gary Lee Price said at the unveiling that he encouraged people to reach out and grasp hands with Harper.

The Alaska Legislature established June 7th as Walter Harper Day thanks to the efforts of Fairbanks Senator Click Bishop. The act recognizes Harper's role in the success of the first summit of Denali, as well as his "superb subsistence skills, his integrity, his strong sense of identity and purpose, and his ability to navigate comfortably in both the Athabascan culture and other cultures of the United States."
