
How to Donate



An Appreciation for our Grantees

Three of our 2022 Grant Recipients graciously hosted Alaska Community Foundation (ACF) visitors Megan Cacciola, VP of Grants and Programs and Carmen Davis, Director of Affiliates to share the impact that these grants provide.

Leigh Bolin, Executive Director and Wendy Carpenter of the Resource Center for Parents and Children gave us a tour of their facility and we were so impressed by the important work that they do. They are true family advocates supporting people in difficult situations. Our grant went to fund their transportation program for the year. This ensured that people who would otherwise not be able to attend important appointments and interviews were provided safe transportation by RCPC staff.

Meredith Maple, Executive Director, gave us a tour of the Fairbanks Children's Museum. Meredith shared that attendance at the museum has doubled this year, and is growing monthly, and her staff are able to handle this influx effectively! The grant from GHCF funded "Museums for All" – which is a nationwide program. This enables low-income families to pay a very reduced rate, so children and their parents can enjoy days of playing and learning at the museum without worrying about the cost.

Tricia Blake, Executive Director of Alaska Songbird Institute talked with us about the research they are doing daily, and how that is contributing to building a worldwide database on the health, migratory patterns, and numbers of the songbird population. The grant they received from GHCF funded their "future scientists" program so kids can work with Tricia and her staff to safely capture and band birds at Cremer's Field. What an awesome way for kids to spend the summer!

I came away so impressed and proud of these hardworking nonprofits and of being part of a foundation like GHCF that supports them.

Impact! At work, at home, on teams, in clubs, in organizations, and in anything we are involved in, we want to know that whatever we do has impact – that we "move the needle" -- to make change, hopefully for the good.

At the Golden Heart Community Foundation (GHCF) we have been working for the past 11 years to build our endowments so that we can impact our community. The bigger our endowments, particularly our Grant Endowment (from which we make grants into the community) the more impact we will have to "do good" in our community.

The larger the endowment, the larger the impact. This means more money for community good works. With our endowment, the more interest it earns, results in more money we can grant. Over the past eleven years it has meant over \$230,000 being given to good causes – making positive change in our community, without depleting the endowment; but instead GROWING the endowment to be able to create even more impact in future years.

GHCF receives community dollars, invests them through our affiliation with the Alaska Community Foundation, and makes money to grant. In the past, by investing money in our endowment, we made impact on: the Food Bank, Rescue Mission, Bread Line, Fairbanks Symphony Orchestra, World Eskimo Indian Olympics, North Star Council on the Aging, and the Literacy Council – just to name a few. The GHCF has reached a major milestone -

\$1 million in our endowment, but we are not resting on our laurels, quite the opposite. We know that the more money we invest and endow, the more we can do for our community. Fairbanks is our home; it's where we raise our families, work, and play. We WANT to make an impact in our community and together with our donors, we do it!
